Creswick Cemeteries News

Improvements have been made to the children's area and under the gum trees on the Creswick side of the cemetery.

The Old Creswick Cemetery in Drummond Street will now be closed to public access. A sign has been placed near the gateway with the names of all those known to still be buried there. Contrary to popular belief, this cemetery was established by the inhabitants of Creswick to bury their loved ones. Few had the means to move their loved ones to the New Cemetery after it officially opened in 1858. Everyone else was left Drummond Street, except some of the Chinese whose remains were removed and taken back to China. We don't know which ones as records were not kept for the Old Cemetery. All names have been researched through Births, Deaths and Marriages, newspaper reports and inquest records.

CresFest Founder, Judy Turner, Recognised by Australian Folk Music Awards



Judy Turner, the dynamic musician and founder of the hugely popular *CresFest* Folk and Roots Festival held in Creswick every April, was awarded the Contribution to Folk Award in Melbourne last month.

CresFest President, Mark Myers said 'a group of us travelled to Melbourne to be part of the celebrations at the annual Australian Folk Music Awards, held at Brunswick Ballroom'. The event, Myers said, was a gathering of the tribe, from all over Australia, with people from every state honoured for their contributions.

'We are very proud of Judy and of all she has achieved for Creswick. At the Awards night we realised how much she has contributed over many decades, to make music an essential part of hundreds, if not thousands, of lives. Her energy and commitment are awe inspiring, and we are lucky to have her living in our region'.

Turner was nominated for the award by Ballarat legend, singer and choir leader Stella Savy, for her pioneering work providing musical opportunities for players of all ages through the creation and maintenance of Melbourne Scottish Fiddle Club, Stringmania Camp, and, of course, *CresFest*.

'Above all', Stella said 'Judy's secret magical power is having great ideas, making them come alive, then enthusing and inspiring other people to the extent they eventually want to take them over'.

And that, Judy says, is the secret of music in community. Stella Savy, now the co-director of *CresFest*, agrees.

Creswick Storm Recovery Committee Transitions to Creswick Readiness Group: Building Resilience Together

As the committee reflects on the achievements of the Creswick Storm Recovery Committee, deepest thanks are extended to Pat Tacey, Leigh Bell, Ron Head, Mark Shalless, Bernie Jordan, Pauline Stapleton, Neil James, Elly Van Oirschot, Don Henderson, Tim Drylie and all those who worked tirelessly to support the community after the devastating floods. The work done has had a lasting impact, and now the Committee is evolving into the Creswick Readiness Group, broadening the focus to ensure the community is prepared for any kind of emergency, whether it be flood, fire, or other hazards.

This transition to **all hazards** preparedness reflects the community's commitment to being ready for whatever challenges may come. By strengthening connections with the wider Hepburn Shire and continuing collaboration with Emergency Management Victoria and various emergency services, the members are taking a proactive approach to building long-term resilience. This is not just about emergency response, it is about fostering lasting relationships, improving communication, and ensuring everyone in the community knows what to do in a time of crisis.

Ways to move forward were discussed at the community dinner on 15 June. The feedback shared at that dinner, as well as from previous listening posts and surveys, has shaped the current focus. Three key themes emerged:

- 1. Community Connectedness: Building a network where everyone knows their role and has someone to turn to in times of crisis.
- 2. Effective Communication: Ensuring timely, clear information reaches all members of the community.
- 3. Utilising Commmunity Skills: Leveraging the vast skills

within our community to ensure that all are as prepared as possible.

The feedback highlighted areas to be addressed, such as the disconnect between those affected by disasters, emergency services and support agencies. It became apparent that some groups, including the homeless, youth and children, require particular attention when it comes to preparedness and resilience.

Moving forward, the Creswick Readiness Group will be working to deliver outcomes based on this feedback. One of its key goals is to develop community-based training and an emergency scenario exercise, likely to take place next year. More will be shared more about these plans in the coming months.

Finally, a special mention goes to the mental health initiatives. There is now a Mental Health First Aid Trainer in town, and there will be opportunities for community members to take part in future training sessions. The mental health impact of disasters is significant, and the Group is committed to supporting the community in this area.

In future articles, the specific actions being taken to address these priorities will be discussed, and all interested in joining the Creswick Readiness Group are invited to reach out. Together, we can ensure Creswick is prepared for whatever the future holds. David C Henderson 12/9/35 - 11/7/2024



In his autobiography *My Tale*, David Charles Henderson would describe himself as a teacher, a fisherman, a hunter, a traveller and an historian, but the sum of these diverse labels came to mean so much more in a life of learning and service.

Born in Ballarat in 1935, David grew up in the Cabbage Tree area of

Creswick near Slaty Creek with his four siblings: Shirley, Dawn, Carol and Don. Though a fairly spartan life by today's standards, his memories of hunting, fishing, exploring the old mine sites and working with horses, tell of an idyllic childhood and taught him that history was alive and all around us.

David attended Creswick Primary School, then Ballarat High School where he earned his Leaving Certificate. That's when he decided to go to Teachers College as it was '... out of the weather, not too physical and the government paid you'. With the Education Department, David served in many schools across the Western District of Victoria, before his first long-term stint at Toolondo, a tiny town south of Horsham. He married June Dunphy in 1957 after meeting her in Brisbane on an eventful motorcycle trip with two mates. After ten years at Toolondo, where his four children were born, the family moved back to Creswick, building a house in Lewers Street for \$7,200.

While completing a Diploma of Art in Ballarat, David worked at Creswick school for one year, then took a promotion at a Daylesford school. He remembered his time at Daylesford as 'a tough timber town, but the

children were great'. After ten years at Daylesford, David became Vice Principal, then Principal at Clunes. In 1981, the position of Head Teacher at the Red Hill School at Sovereign Hill was advertised and David applied immediately: 'It was my childhood down to the ground horse-drawn vehicles, gold panning, mining and cooking over an open fire'. He was required to dress in 1850s costume. Students from all over Victoria would come for two days to be immersed in 1850s gold rush town. David even made all their costumes himself - about 1,000 sets all up, which he kept mended.

In 1990, David retired from teaching and became a member of FOSH (Friends of Sovereign Hill), and kept volunteering taking school groups through Sovereign Hill. He wrote three little books for children called *Golden Tales* which sold well. He was eventually awarded Life Membership of FOSH, as was his wife June.

David had a great sense of community. He was a foundation member of Apex in Creswick, founded OASIS (Old Apexians Still Interested in Service) when he became too old for Apex, introduced soccer to Daylesford, then at different times was President, Secretary and Treasurer of the Creswick Soccer Club. He was a founding member of the Creswick Historical Society. The maps he drew for the Walking Tour of Creswick and the David Henderson Map are still great historical resources today.

David's friends called him an interesting character with a dry sense of humour, always ready to get in and contribute. David was an historian who actually *lived* history and his legacy will live on. As he wrote in his autobiography: 'With the support of my late wife June, I have had a wonderful life'.

David is survived by his four children, ten grandchildren and one great granddaughter.

Hepburn Shire residents and property owners can dispose of green waste for free at transfer stations in Daylesford, Creswick and Trentham during November. Things to remember:

- Bring along some proof of residency.
- Separate your load green material should be separated from other items being brought in.
- Noxious weeds should not be transported or brought to the transfer stations.
- Excludes commercial quantities of waste.







FIRE DANGER RATING SYSTEM

The Australian Fire Danger Rating System (AFDRS) is simple and easy to understand. The higher the rating, the more dangerous the conditions will be.

A Fire Danger Rating:

- is declared for a fire area and is based on local government
- describes the consequences of a fire if one was to start. It does not indicate the chance of a fire occurring
- is calculated using a combination of weather forecasting and information about vegetation that could fuel a fire
- of extreme and above will usually mean a Total Fire Ban is declared
- that is high and above will lead to burn-off permits being suspended
- can be used to trigger your bushfire survival plan.

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

St Augustine's News Growth, Both Personal and Horticultural

School life seems to be bubbling along. It is wonderful to see the growth of all students as they continue in their learning journeys. The Year 6s are leading the way, their approach to their studies should be commended. Today I was lucky enough to be in the Year 6, Year 5 and Prep classrooms. The Year 6s were learning about low and high modality words and how they can impact emotive language. The Year 5s were incorporating the Mentor Text strategy with the text *Wild Australian Life* by Leonard Cronin and Chris Nixon and Preps were writing sentences and paragraphs about the way they are feeling. That was all before 10.00am!

The school continues to welcome the newest students to St Augustine's and are reminded how essential a Prep Transition program is, and how surrounding Kindergartens do a fantastic job in preparing the children. We believe our programs are designed to ease the transition for young learners into primary school. Staff have organised engaging activities of discovery based learning, and the children are becoming familiar with their new environment, meeting peers, and forming connections with their teachers.

The school's Creswick Community Garden continues to thrive, providing a wonderful opportunity for students to engage with nature and learn about sustainable practices. This hands-on project, led by the Year 6 leaders, not only promotes healthy habits but also fosters a sense of community as students come together to plant, tend, and harvest a variety of vegetables. Thanks to Chrissy, Norm and Alfie from the Neighbourhood Centre for their support with this project.

The Year 6 Bike Education program is off to an exciting start. This program teaches students essential cycling skills and road safety, empowering them to navigate their surroundings confidently. With hands-on sessions both in the schoolyard and on local roads, students are learning about bike maintenance, traffic rules and the importance of wearing helmets and being safe.

The Performing Arts program is flourishing this term, with students exploring their creativity through singing, dancing and movement. Ms Kate Snow often talks about the creativity and zest the children display. The Performing Arts program is essential as it encourages self-expression and teamwork, culminating in the Christmas Concert, a showcase where students can perform for their peers and families. The Spring Season and Baby Birds

During spring, many of Victoria's young birds are going through the fledgling stage of their development. Wildlife Victoria has advice about what to do if you see a young bird on the ground.

A young bird goes through the following stages before becoming fully independent:

Leaving the nest: These birds are starting to leave the nest but can only hop around a little. The parents should be nearby, or off collecting some food for the little one and will be back shortly.

Fledgling: After fledglings emerge out of their nest, they can spend up to two weeks on the ground while learning to fly. These birds are starting to run around and may even have a go at flying, but they might not have the hang of it just yet.

During this period, they are still being fed by their parents and should not be interfered with unless obviously injured. Parents should still be watching out for them. Fledglings may leave the nest for up to six hours, so don't be worried if you aren't seeing them regularly.

Wildlife Victoria can offer several ways to join the network of volunteers. Rescue and transport volunteers attend to injured, sick, or orphaned native animals and if needed,



capture, contain and transport the animal to a vet. Foster carers are authorised under Wildlife Shelter Operators to gain experience and guidance in the care and treatment of native wildlife. In Victoria, sick, injured or orphaned wildlife can only be rehabilitated by a wildlife shelter operator or foster carer who is authorised by the Conservation Regulator under the Wildlife Act. The Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action hold all Shelter and Foster Carer licences. Wildlife Victoria emergency response line 8400 7300 operates 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

November 4, 1924

Residents of Creswick and district are reminded that the third annual reunion of the Old Creswickian Association will be held in the supper room of the Melbourne town hall on Wednesday (to-morrow) night. An enjoyable time is anticipated.

November 7, 1924

The Commonwealth Gazette published the results of the examination held recently for a vacancy on the Creswick Post Office staff. Harold Grose was first, and Walwin Arch second. The other candidates were H. Booth, P. George, R. Drummond, R. Allen, Lionel Harridge, A. Felstead, C. Smart and T. Heagney. The marks obtained were higher than those secured by the candidates at a similar examination in Geelong, the results of which also appear in the "Gazette". The promotion of Mr. Douglas Arch from the Creswick Post Office will shortly cause another vacancy.

November 11, 1924

Heavy rain was experienced last week. Commencing on Tuesday, 69 points were registered at the local town hall the following morning, 45 points on Thursday morning, 56 points on Friday morning, and 92 points on Saturday morning. Shortly after 1 o'clock on Friday there was a very heavy shower of over half an inch in a few minutes. The Creswick Creek rose rapidly until it overflowed its banks in places. The footbridge near the bowling green suffered, one of the piers giving way, letting down the bridge in one place. A little below Davies' bridge the water spread across the Clunes road, and also surrounded the outbuildings at Featherstone's butcher's shop. The north end of Cambridge street was also damaged. The total rainfall for November to date is 3 inches 9 points. In the same month of last year 1 inch 46 points fell.

November 14, 1924

Those desirous of preserving eggs would do well to peruse the advertisement in another column of Mr. W. B. Maine, chemist, of Albert street, who has in stock the "Keepwell" Solution, in tins at 1/ and 2/3.

November 18, 1924

The committee of the Creswick Mechanics' Institute and Free Library have decided to instal a second billiard table in the institute. They tendered for the purchase of the billiard table and all accessories in the defunct Soldiers' Club room at the town hall, at £52/10/, and being the highest offer made, it was accepted by the trustees at a meeting held last Saturday evening.

November 21, 1924

Ex-Cr. Richard Hender, of North Creswick, on Tuesday last, 18th November, attained the great age of 82 years. His friends will be pleased to know that he is in good health, but his hearing has become affected and the years have taken toll of his legs and joints to some extent. Mr. Hender remarks that he hopes to be able to "canter" around the yard for a few more birthdays. He is one of the very old residents of the district, and lived a very active life until advancing years caused his retirement into private life.


November 25, 1924

Blampied – Landowners and farmers in this district are almost without exception establishing telephone communication, and there have been fifteen recent connections with the local post office. Further applications are being made and the department is displaying every effort to meet their wishes, for it is officially recognised that the telephone contributes much to the convenience of isolated rural life.

November 28, 1924

A meeting of the trustees of the Victorian Mining Accident Relief Fund is to be held in Melbourne on Wednesday next. Applications from persons in this district who desire relief must be lodged with the Mayor (Cr. T. Cushing) not later than tomorrow (Saturday) . Note-this was originally the money raised for the victim's families of the Australasian No. 2 mine disaster of 1882.
